The New York Center and GRI are pleased to offer the third iteration of the lecture series, **Foundational Concepts in Group Relations Theory**. In each session Dr. Rosenbaum will discuss and expand on fundamentals of Group Relations theory, based on assigned readings from foundational texts in GR theory and practice. Some brief experiential exercises and other media may be used to illustrate concepts.

Topics to be covered in this series will include:

- Boundaries, Authority, Role and Task (BART)
- Bion's basic assumptions
- The nature of the unconscious
- Projection, splitting and scapegoating
- The meaning of "Group as a Whole"

Who should attend:

 Anyone who has attended at least one Group Relations Conference or equivalent experience is welcome.

This series may be particularly useful for those who:

- Have not had teaching on GR theory in school or professional training,
- Do not have a background in psychology or a related field,
- Wish to deepen their understanding of the fundamentals of GR theory.
